A Look at State College of Florida, Manatee-Sarasota

Established in 1957, State College of Florida, Manatee-Sarasota (SCF) is the region's first and largest public college. In the Fall 2019 term, more than 10,000 college credit students were enrolled at campuses in Bradenton, Lakewood Ranch and Venice, and online. Each year thousands more attend professional development and personal enrichment classes. The College has graduated 52,638 students from 1958 to 2019.

Florida's performance funding system for state and community colleges ranked SCF among the high performing institutions of Florida's 28 state/community colleges. The model consists of four measures: completion rates, retention rates, job placement/continuing education and completer entry wages. SCF received incentive funding for the 2019-20 year based on its overall performance on these criteria.

SCF is a dynamic College dedicated to meeting the educational and workforce training needs of citizens and businesses in the region. SCF has expanded its mission to include workforce baccalaureate degrees while continuing to focus on highly respected associate degrees that prepare graduates for university transfer and professional careers.





Fall 2010-Fall 2019 College Credit Headcount*




Fall Term Enrollment




Spring 2011-Spring 2020 Credit Students by Gender *



Fall Term Enrollment







Spring Term Enrollment






Spring 2011-Spring 2020 Credit Students by Load Hours*

Fall Term Enrollment










Spring 2019-Spring 2020 Age Distribution of Part-Time Students*




Fall 2019 Degree Types and AS Degree Enrollments



Fall 2019 Baccalaureate and Certificate Enrollments






Spring 2020 Degree Types and AS Degree Enrollments






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Spring 2020 Baccalaureate and Certificate Enrollments








Annual Full-Time Equivalent



Funded Annual Full-Time Equivalent (FTE) Enrollment by Campus 2019-20*








Fall 2019-Headcount 10,193


Fall Students by Gender




Fall Students by Age



Fall Full-Time by Gender




Fall Full-Time Students Receiving Pell



Fall Students by Race/Ethnicity










Spring Full-Time Students Receiving Pell




FTIC Students by Age




FTIC Students by Race/Ethnicity






First-Time-In-College (FTIC) Students *




FTIC Students by Age






FTIC Hour Status




FTIC Students by Race/Ethnicity




Summer 2019 Load Hours


Fall 2019 Load Hours




Fall 2019 Online Student Profile



Fall Students by Gender








Fall Full-Time Students Receiving Pell










Fall 2019 Baccalaureate Student Profile











Spring Baccalaureate Enrollment by Major




Summer Term Enrollment

Summer 2010 - Summer 2019 Credit Students by Gender *







Summer Students by Age







Student Progress Summer 2019 Grade Distribution


Summer 2019 Total Classes

Summer 2019 College Preparatory Classes





Student Progress Fall 2019 Grade Distribution


Fall 2019 Total Classes*

Fall 2019 College Preparatory Classes






Student Progress Spring 2020 Grade Distribution

Library Services

Mission: The SCF libraries engage students, faculty, staff and community members in the discovery and creation of knowledge.

Library Collection and Use

The library provides resources and services that facilitate the research, study, scholarship and intellectual pursuits of our college community.

Resources include physical collections of books, movies, magazines, journals and newspapers. Print resources not available in SCF libraries can be borrowed from other libraries, through the interlibrary loan program. Digital collections include eBooks, digital music, streaming video, eJournals, eAudiobooks, proprietary databases/indexes containing the full text of journals, magazines, government documents, radio, television broadcasts, newspapers, legal publications and more.

The librarians provide expert reference assistance and teach information literacy across the curriculum through individualized, online and group library instruction.

Each library offers quiet and collaborative study spaces, group study rooms, presentation practice rooms, computers, printing and copying. Laptops and iPads are also available for checkout by students and can be used to access the available wireless network.

In early 2018, the new state-of-the-art Library and Learning Center opened at SCF Bradenton with collaborative spaces and technology hubs.










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Enrollment, Graduation & Retention Rates of FTIC Cohort
State College of Florida, Manatee-Sarasota - A.S. Students 2019 Reporting Year




Enrollment, Graduation & Retention Rates of FTIC Cohort Florida College System - A.S. Students 2019 Reporting Year




Mean Cumulative GPA of Florida College System Graduates Attending Florida Public Universities






SCF students receiving an Associate in Science degree (A.S.) or an Associate in Applied Science degree (A.A.S.), as depicted in the chart, have been successful in securing employment in their chosen fields or continuing their education.

Placement data is gathered by the Florida Education and Training **Placement Information Program** (FETPIP) from various sources. FETPIP uses confidential follow-up data that describe the employment, military enlistment and continuing education experience of those individuals followed. The data are collected by using "record linkage" through the Florida Department of Education, the Agency for Workforce Innovation, US Postal Service and the Department of Children and Families, just to list a few. By linking common data elements in different databases, FETPIP has been successful in generating and providing useful follow-up data on former students about their continuing education and/or job placement in the state of Florida.

SCF Placement Results for A.S. and Certificate Graduates










Grants, Scholarships, and Loans Totals in Dollars 2013-2014 through 2018-2019




EMPLOYEESFull-Time Employees by Classification, Race and Gender 2019-20

Full-Time Faculty - Level of Educational Attainment*





2019-20 Operating Budget General Fund Expenditures







State College of Florida, Manatee-Sarasota used the time period of September 2014 through June 2015 to develop its Strategic Plan for 2015-2020. An inductive process was used to maximize involvement from across all stakeholder groups (students, faculty, staff, community, administrators, and Board members) of the College. Focus group meeting and electronic surveys were used to develop the bold vision that resulted in a written plan approved by the Board of Trustees in June 2015. After thousands of inputs, four Strategic Priorities (listed below) were developed with seven enabling strategies.

STRATEGIC PRIORITY #1

Ensure that SCF programs are available to students in all geographic locations of our service region.

- Implement a virtual Online Campus to assist students from recruitment to graduation, allowing students to take credit courses at their most
 convenient time and place to learn.
- . Increase physical presence in the rapid growth area east of I-75 and north of the Manatee River.
- Increase flagship programs unique to SCF Venice.
- Centralize high cost/high demand Health Science programs within the two-county service district.

STRATEGIC PRIORITY #2

Develop a concierge-style student experience focused on enhancing student recruitment and performance outcomes.

- Increase student enrollment, retention rates and completion rates.
- Increase student job placement/continuing education rates.
- · Increase investment in technology solutions and skill development.

STRATEGIC PRIORITY #3

Aggressively engage faculty/program managers/business and community leaders in collaborative curriculum development from start to implementation for programs that are rapidly responsive to workforce needs.

- . Increase the number and quality of workforce program offerings to address employer demand and student interest.
- Increase the number of internships for students.
- Implement a program development fund to encourage and reward creative and collaborative curriculum development.
- Increase faculty and staff expertise in data analysis and use, performance management and project planning.

STRATEGIC PRIORITY #4

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Glossary of Terms

A.A. degree - The Associate in Arts (A.A.) degree allows students to transfer to upper division college programs and universities to complete four-year degrees. Students may enter as juniors in their chosen major as long as core prerequisites have been met.

A.A.S. degree - The Associate in Applied Science (A.A.S.) degree prepares graduates for immediate entry into the workplace. SCF has ended all A.A.S. programs. It stopped admitting new students into these programs in fall 2013 and offered courses for program completion through summer 2015. Any former A.A.S. majors should contact the corresponding A.S. degree program manager for appropriate advising.

A.S. degree - The Associate in Science (A.S.) degrees offer articulation to Florida public colleges/universities that award baccalaureate degrees in matching disciplines. Credit will transfer and allow students to enter as a junior provided all admission requirements and common core prerequisites for the discipline have been met.

Accountability Measures - The Florida Legislature developed specific criteria by which the instructional and administrative efficiency and effectiveness of Florida community/state colleges are measured.

B.A.S. degree - The Bachelor of Applied Science (B.A.S.) degree is associated with programs designed to accommodate the unique demands for entry and advancement within specific workforce sectors.

Blended Courses - Courses taught partly in the classroom and partly online.

B.S. degree - The Bachelor of Science (B.S.) degree is awarded for completion of an undergraduate course of study usually lasting for four years (full-time). This designation is normally used for undergraduate degrees outside of liberal arts studies.

B.S.N. degree - The Bachelor of Science in Nursing (B.S.N.) degree program provides current registered nurses (RN) with the opportunity to obtain a bachelor's degree in nursing.

College Preparatory Courses - Non-exempt, First-Time-In-College students who apply for degree programs are placed in college preparatory courses when their college entry test scores in basic skill areas are below the level set by the Florida State Board of Education.

Community College Survey of Student Engagement (CCSSE) - Assesses students' level of engagement in different aspects of the college experience.

Credit- Classes earn varied hours of college credit that count toward a degree.

Entry Level Testing (ELT) - Placement tests are required for non-exempt First-Time-In-College students seeking a degree from SCF. The test instruments include the Postsecondary Educational Readiness Test (PERT), SAT I and ACT.

Exempt students-As per SB 1720, students who entered a Florida public high school (ninth grade) during the 2003-2004 school year or any year thereafter and graduated with a Florida standard high school diploma or are active-duty armed forces personnel are exempt from taking any entry level testing. They are also exempt from having to enroll in any college preparatory courses.

First-Time-In-College (FTIC) - First-Time-In-College (FTIC) students are students who enter the College having never attended college previously at this or any other institution.

Florida College System (FCS) - The Florida College System (FCS) is made up of 28 locally governed public state/community colleges, which are coordinated under the jurisdiction of the State Board of Education.

Grade Point Average (GPA) - The grade point average is computed by calculating the total number of points earned for all courses divided by the total number of credits taken.

Load Hour - A load hour is equal to a semester hour for college credit and/or preparatory courses.

Online Learning - Online Learning describes courses conducted outside a traditional classroom setting using online courses, blended courses, videotapes, television courses and videoconferencing. The instructor may not be in the same classroom as the student.

Placement Rate - Follow-up data that describe the employment, military enlistment and continuing education experience of A.A., A.S., A.A.S. and certificate graduates.

Survey of Entering Student Engagement (SENSE) - Assesses the entering students' level of engagement in different aspects of the college experience.

SUS - Public universities in the Florida State University System: FAMU, FAU, FGCU, FIU, FPU, FSU, NCF, UNF, UCF, UF, USF and UWF.

Unduplicated Headcount - Unduplicated headcount enrollment is a count of the number of students enrolled in a specified period (i.e., term, academic year) with each individual student counted **only** once.





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
