COURSE DESCRIPTION

HUM 1020 - Introduction to the Humanities (3) (A.A.). No Prerequisite. This course meets Area IV requirements of the A.A./A.S. general education requirements. This course is a basic introduction into the study of the Humanities intended to establish or broaden an appreciation of the arts. The course surveys the development, function, and influences of the various humanistic disciplines as they are expressed in different cultures across time through either a thematic or chronological interdisciplinary approach. The primary humanistic disciplines explored in the course include the visual arts, literature, performing arts, philosophy, history, and mythology/religion.

The student, at the successful completion of this course, will be able to:


1. Identify the various disciplines and genres that make up the Humanities.
2. Demonstrate knowledge of the basic vocabulary used to identify the essential characteristics of the various humanistic disciplines.
3. Identify the major contributions in the humanistic arts of individual artists, thinkers, cultures, and historical periods.

4. Demonstrate knowledge of the various developments in the humanistic arts as they are affected by historical, social, political, economic, and religious events of the times.
5. Demonstrate an understanding of the interrelatedness of the humanistic disciplines.
6. Describe the importance that artistic phenomena play in the development of a nation, civilization, or culture.
7. Recognize the values represented in the art and mythology/religion of different cultures and correlate those ideas/values with one's own philosophy of life and everyday living.
8. Demonstrate an awareness of the interdependency of world cultures and their relationships in the arts, philosophy, and mythology/religion.
9. Apply knowledge of the humanistic disciplines by experiencing an artistic/cultural event (such as a museum exhibition, theatrical play, or orchestra/symphony concert).
10. Students will demonstrate their use of technology as appropriate for class assignments. This may include, but is not limited to, such technological skills as email communication, digital drop boxes, and discussion forums.

You should also have the latest versions of **Adobe Acrobat Reader** (a free download) and **Microsoft Word, PowerPoint, and Sway**. The entire Microsoft Office suite of software is provided to you for free as SCF students from your SCF Connect account.

In addition to the minimum requirements to access Canvas, I also strongly recommend having a **working webcam**. A working webcam and microphone are helpful for both virtual office hours and possible online discussions.

ATTENDANCE POLICY

Online Attendance:

1. Chapter Reading Quizzes = 20% of Final Grade

Quizzes will be given covering the assigned textbook readings. These will be short, general information quizzes consisting of multiple choice and True/False questions and can be **accessed through each Chapter Module on Canvas.**

II. Video Quizzes = 20% of Final Grade

Students will be assigned short videos (2-10 minutes) that correspond to chapter material. Quiz questions are embedded in the videos and appear as students watch each video. Students must watch the entire video and then click the "Submit" button when the video ends in order to submit the quiz for grading.

III. Unit Exams = 30% of Final Grade

Three Unit Exams will constitute 30% of your final grade (10% each) and may consist of True/False, multiple choice, and/or Art Identification questions. **Unit Exams will be given on Canvas and can be accessed through each Unit Exam Module on Canvas.**

IV. Attendance at Humanities Event/Response Paper = 30% of Final Grade

Students will be responsible for **attending one in-person Humanities event during the semester and writing a response paper about their experience.** You will have the option to either visit an **Art Museum/Art Gallery** OR to attend a **Performing Arts Event (a live theater, music, or dance performance).**

There are detailed instructions sheets for each type of event in the "Course Syllabus and Policies" Module. **Completion of the Humanities Experience assignment is necessary to receive a passing grade in the course.**

Please plan your attendance at one of these events early in the semester to make sure you are able to complete it before the end of the term.

LATE WORK POLICY

Students may turn in any course assignment after the due date with a **15% deduction per day penalty.**

This applies to any late assignment for any reason and students do not need to get approval to submit late assignments.

Any assignment is considered late if it is submitted after 11:59pm on the date it is due. At 15% per day, this means any assignment submitted more than a week (7 days) after the due date will be mathematically reduced to a grade of 0.
